Part One

- 1. In Part 1 you will be asked some personal questions. What kind of topics could you be asked questions about? Which are the most common topics?
- 2. What different kinds of questions will you be asked about each topic?
- 3. Part One ends four minutes after you enter the room. In that time, how many topics will you usually be asked about? How many questions on each topic?
- 4. What is a good answer to a question? What happens if you give a short answer?
- 5. What happens if you don't understand the question?
- 6. How can you study to help prepare for Speaking Part One?

Part Two

- 7. In Part 2 you are given a sheet with a topic and four questions that you have to speak about (a kind of mini-presentation). What are the minimum and maximum amounts of time you must speak for?
- 8. What happens if you speak for less than the minimum amount of time?
- 9. If the examiner interrupts you at the end, is that a good thing or a bad thing?
- 10. How much time do you have to prepare before you start speaking in Part 2?
- 11. What can you and should you do to prepare before you speak?

Part Three

- 12. In Part 3 you are asked questions again but it is more challenging than the earlier parts of the exam. How is it different from Part 1?
- 13. What is a good answer to a Speaking Part Three question?
- 14. How is the topic in Part Three related to other parts of the exam?
